The ending scenes in a tragedy are often comparatively short. Unlike a positive story, Fall Arcs leave few loose ends and don't usually inspire in readers a desire to stick around in the story world. Answer the following questions to help you.

Now that the plot goal has proved itself utterly unworthy of the sacrifices the protagonist made, how is she able to face the future?
How will the available choices for her new life moving forward contrast with the choices she was offered back in the first chapter?
If your protagonist died in the Climax, how can you indicate what will happen to the surviving characters moving forward?



Name three ways you can contrast the Normal World from the beginning of the story with the new normal?
